Thank you for your generosity, both in the past and in the future. All that being said. If anyone knows of someone disposing of a collection rather cheaply, please let us know. We may be able to purchase some or all of it for raffle purposes. Just a note on this, to those that will now ask, why didn't we buy some of Bill Collins collection. I would have loved to, but conditions are/were different. To be fair to his family. If we had offered 50% of the value of his kits, \$100 would have got us maybe four kits. All be it, 4 good, interesting kits. If we are shelling out \$100 for kits, I'm expecting somewhere near a dozen or more good kits. I'm talking deep discounts here.

We, the club and the newsletter, are in need of articles. They can be short filler pieces or longer articles. Possibly some of the newer members could write short auto-biographies about themselves. Just where you come from, how you got here, how long you've been modeling, favorite modeling subjects, etc. We can use longer articles, such as kit reviews and product reviews. Hints and tips. Short fillers in the "my favorite kit" series. That can easily be changed to my first kit, my last kit, or the "kit from hell" Who are the influencers in your modeling career? Let us know. We don't expect Pulitzer Prize winning journalism. Ok, I take that back, we do expect it but will settle for just about anything. Thanks in advance.

Just in case this issue gets out to you all, before the December meeting, I want to remind you that we will be having the kit exchange. If you wish to participate you can wrap a kit, reference books, etc., stuff hobby related, in holiday wrap, aluminum foil, newspaper, or plain brown wrapper. It does not have to be new, but it must be in good condition, and un-started. No gag gifts, please.



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As of the time that I write this column, the January meeting is open. No one has offered to take it. I think this is a meeting that Bill Collins usually took. We, the board will be putting our heads together and try to resolve this. Possibly we will rent a small hall or hotel conference room to hold the meeting. Please keep close watch on the forum and club Facebook page for an announcement. And please, if you see it posted, help get the word out to fellow members that may not be forum or Facebook followers.

We knew in advance that John Gisetto was not going to be at the show. He had notified us and we had time to ask for help. About a week before the show, we were notified that the hall would not rent tables for us, and they didn't have all the tables we needed. (I was told that this was because we hadn't paid our bill from the year before, which we had never received. More on this later.) So that was a bit of a scramble to get that resolved. We went with Ocean State Rental, because they were the outfit that the hall went thru. They had to have a 50% deposit in hand before they would deliver. That was where the scramble was. We did find out why the previous year's bill was so high, it's \$9 per table with an \$85 delivery fee. Next year we will start looking earlier and try to have a better plan, (read as cheaper), in place. We also find out, just a few days before the show, that Renee and Pat McColgen had another commitment. They usually run the raffle. So some more stepping up was required. And where was Ambassador McCormick?

As to last year's table bill. At last January's meeting, we were told that the hall had to rent about 10 tables for our 2017 show. (We had been told that they had enough to meet our needs.) Ok, no big deal. A couple months later we were told the bill was \$264. Ok, now big deal. That's a lot more tables then 10. We needed something in writing explaining what had been rented for us. It was presented to me at the November show. It is now paid. I have forgotten the exact number of tables but there was a \$75 delivery fee, which helps explain it. I am not sure how many tables were needed, but throw in the delivery fee, and some tax and I can see how it quickly got to \$264.

So, the show. What do you want to know? We had 79 entrants. That is seven less than last year. The number of entries, the models on the tables, well, it depends on the source. If you go by the registration book it's 316 entries. That would be 157 less than last year. If you go by the number the judges judged, its 319. (Each category judging sheet has a space to be filled in by the judges as to the number of models in the category. Add them all up and you get 319.) If you total up all of the master entry forms, each modeler filled out, its 337. So why the discrepancies? A couple possible reasons. It could, in a couple cases, be a matter of trying to put one over on us, claim 5, pay \$5, and put 6 on the table. The other possibility is that a number of models never saw the tables. They were left home or the modeler decided not to enter them. (There was one sheet that had two entries crossed out.)

Our spectator fee for the show is \$3, \$2 for seniors. Because of that, and the fact that we don't count, we don't know how many spectators visit our show. All of the entry fees and spectator fees go into the same cash box. I take and count up all of the money in the box, subtract the entry fees and divide that amount by three and that tells me the minimum number of spectators. This year it was 160. We can





conservatively estimate that at least 30% of the spectators came in on the Sr. pass, which would bring us up to 179. 40% Sr. would give us 181.

We had our first major incident at this show. A figure was stolen off the display table. The modeler registered, placed the model on the table, went back out to his car, came back and the figure was gone. The hall was searched, (maybe Bob had it to be photographed). The Smithfield police were called. We asked for witnesses, two came forward. The Officer filed a report. The figure was of a cavewoman, about 12" tall. I mention this because we have a number of members that attend shows. This newsletter goes out to all of the IPMS chapters. I hope it serves as a warning to them and I hope they take notice of any cavewoman figures that show up at their shows, just in case someone starts campaigning it. Especially if it seems to be above the skill level of the person entering it. We would like to hear from them.

Otherwise, 21 Bay Colony Members entered 75 models at BayCon. That would be 27% of the entrants and 22% of the models. They took 53 awards (29%). There should be a breakdown of the show numbers elsewhere in this issue.

One award that was awarded that Sunday afternoon, Best Small Airforce, and we couldn't find it. That's on me. I missed it. It was never ordered. It will be ordered, very soon. I was waiting until the results were completed, in case there were any other changes. Oh, yeah, the results are completed. This may be the earliest I've ever been done.

As mentioned above, we were down a couple of key personnel for the show. People that know the role they fill and get it done. So people stepped up. Bob Don got the raffle started and Chris Libucha took over and ran it for the day. Of course this left Chris's line judge position open. Terry Sumner stepped up and took that slot. Many people stepped up to help with the judging. I saw a number of names on the judging sheets, both from inside the club and from out. I'd like to see some of the people from the club that maybe judged for the first time, or for the first time with us, write a paragraph or two for the newsletter about their experience.

Please forgive me if I miss someone's name, it's not intentional. So many were involved in the production and running of the show. From the set up crew that was at the hall Saturday evening, setting up and covering tables, to the cleanup crew that pulled off the same covering and packed away the legs. Our thanks go out to you all. To the judges, especially the judges, thanks for getting that job done. That includes our club members and the non-club members that all helped.

There are some people that have to be named. These are the people that make the show go. Two stand out, Joe Russum and Mike McNamara. I think it's the third year in a row that the two of them have commanded the registration table. Right behind them are Gian Montecalvo, Chris Libucha, Paul Champigny, Bob Magina, Bob Don, Ray Rosario, Peter Jardim, Steve Kwasny, Terry Sumner, and John Gisetto. My thanks go out to you all. Our thanks! There is not enough room in this column to tell you all that they do.





And finally, I have one gripe. You guys have to learn to take care of your stuff. As I leave the hall, last man out, I gather up all of the things left behind. From now on there will be a ransom or finder's fee to get your cell phones and cameras back.

Sorry, no history lecture today, maybe next time. Wait, don't run out. There is homework...!

ATTENTION MODEL STOLEN AT BAYCON 2018

The stolen figure in question was in the possession Michael Gondor (the claimant), 11 14 th Avenue, Shelton, CT 06484, (ph: 475-422-63380). He placed the figure on display at our annual show, BayCon 2018, on Nov. 11, 2018, at the Elks Hall in Smithfield, RI, from where it was taken.

The Smithfield Police were called in. Two witnesses, as well as Michael, were interviewed. The Smithfield Police report number is 18-1048-OF (Oscar foxtrot). We have been producing this show on an annual basis for about 35 years and this is the first incident of this nature.

The figure kit was produced by Solarwind Productions and is a resin 1/6 scale cave woman dressed in a leopard skin and carrying a club. The completed figure stands about 12 1/2" tall. Michael remembers spending approximately \$130 for the kit. I have not been able to locate a website for Solarwind Productions, and the forums that I found discussing Solarwind date back to 2005 -2006. Which makes me suspect that Solarwind is no longer in business. Similar kits are often referred



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to as "garage' kits because they are produced by very small companies in garages and basements. The molds are silicone or vulcanized rubber from which they can produce 10 to 100 castings before the molds deteriorate to a point where they cannot be used. I found similar kits produced by Solarwind Productions offered on EBay for \$200 to \$225.

Michael also accepted a commission to build and paint the figure, which he had to return. It is a common practice to stipulate the right to "show" the model before turning it over to its new owner.

If you know anything about the stolen figure please report it to either IPMS Bay Colony Modelers or the Smithfield, Rhode Island Police. Please spread the word about this theft to other modelers and model clubs.

First View - Damxged

Full title, "Damxged – Weathered & Worn". This is a new publication, brought to us by Fine Scale Modeler. It is the product of a joint venture between Fine Scale (Kalmbach Media) and AK Interactive. The first issue is out, (Winter 2018), and I happen to have one in my sweaty little hands. The Editorial column by Aaron Skinner, (of Fine Scale fame), states that they have three more issues underway. The column also states that their intent is to avoid the combat aircraft and military vehicles that "dominate the hobby' and concentrate on the "rest of modeling'.

If you are a subscriber to Fine Scale or Scale auto, you have probably been inundated with promotional emails over the last couple of months, like I have. I wanted to see the mag first before I ordered it. With a cover price of \$9.99, the emails offered you a discount.

The magazine is all color and is in the larger European format. Like many of the slick European modeling magazines, each article begins with a materials list, which lists the kit used, tools used, and paint or coloring materials used. Then it goes step by step describing how the weathering or damage was done. The techniques and materials used in the articles will stretch across all modeling genres. Each article is written by a different modeler, this will give you insight into how that particular modeler tackles a problem. Others may approach it differently. You get to read their approach and see which best fits your modeling style and supplies.

Although AK Interactive is a partner I this endeavor, their products are not the focus of the articles. The materials used do appear in the photos, not prominently, but you can normally make out what they are. If you are an eclectic modeler, not anchored to just aircraft or armor, or are looking for a change of pace, you might want to check it out.

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BayCon 2018 - By the Numbers

Analysis of the Show

by the Chief Bottle Washer and Statistician

Seventy nine entrants entered 316 models (Registration book), or 319 models (based on the judges count), or 337 models (from the Master Entry sheets). Working with 319, which averages out to 4.03 models per modeler. There were 9 junior entrants. There were 62 aircraft models (19.4%), 60 Armor (18.8%), 16 ships (5%), 77 automotive (24%), 31 Figures (10%), and 43 Misc. (13%).

We gave out 180 awards. Forty five First place awards, 42 Seconds, 36 Thirds, 33 Fourths, 22 Special Awards, and two top awards. 91% of the entrants took home awards. 21 Bay Colony members (26.6% of the entrants), entered 75 models (22.3%), and took 51 awards (28.3%). 20 members from other clubs (25.3%), entered 111 models (32.9%), and took 60 awards (33.3%). The un-affiliated modelers, 38 of them (48.1%), entered 151 models (44.8%), and collected 67 awards (37.2%).

We have 47 categories. With 319 models, that is an average of 6.78 models per category. Category 2.03 Armor, *pre 1946, 1/59 and larger*, was the most populated with 25 entries. Our top scorers are Steve Kwasny going 3 awards for 2 models, an APM of 1.50, Gil Costa going 5 for 4, an APM of 1.25, Peter Jardim going 3 for 3, Paul Williams going 2 for 2, Phil LaBounty and Barry Johnston going 1 for 1, all with an APM of 1.00. Using my patented scoring system, Gil Costa, Joe McDonald Jr. and Javier Brown are tied with 18 points each, Joe Ravino has 14 points, Steve Kwasny (5.50 PPM) and Peter Jardim (3.667 PPM) each had 11 points, and Bob Don 10 points.

From outside the club the high scorers are Luis Silva with 38 points (10 awards, 8 firsts), Mac Johnston and Stephen Robie with 19 points each, William Moreau with 17 points, Mike DiFilippo, William Horton, and Grace Leavitt each with 16 points, and Brian Saksa with 15 points.

Of the entrants that claimed membership with other clubs besides Bay Colony, 16 different clubs were listed.

And as to travelers, the Leavitts came from South Portland (165 miles), Philip Lechbranski came from Shelter Island, NY (90 miles via ferry, 4 hrs.), William Moreau came down from North Ferrisburgh, VT (280 miles), Luis Silva came from Linden, NJ (203), Tom Urban came from Baiting Hollow, NY (109 miles via ferry, 4 hours), and Russell Hopely came down from Bath, ME (198 miles).

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

Review:

Fine Scale Modeler – Airbrushing for Scale Modelers, Kalmbach Books, 2015 By Aaron Skinner

In the past, Fine Scale has cobbled together past articles and produced books on varying subjects. This is an entirely new book with all new chapters / articles. It is softbound, $8 \frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" format, and 127 pages.

The book is in two parts or sections. The first five chapters discuss all the basics. The second part of the book includes 14 step by step projects.

The First Five:

- Choosing an Airbrush Discusses how an airbrush works and the different types of airbrushes available
- Understanding the Basics Discusses paint, thinners and the effect of air pressure. There is a handy table listing 21 popular paint lines, what to thin it with and appropriate ratios of paint to thinner.
- Mastering the Tool Discusses how to paint moving the airbrush, distance to surface, holding the parts to be painted, surface prep, primer, and order of colors.
- Masking This is probably one of the most important chapters. Almost anyone that airbrushes has to mask at one time or another. It discusses hard edge, semi-soft edge and soft edge techniques, and a number of different masking materials.
- Maintenance and Troubleshooting Discusses how to take care of and clean your airbrush and some products you can use to do it. It also addresses how to identify problems and how to correct them.

The 14 Projects:

The projects run the gamut as to subject matter. Four of the projects are armor. Seven of the projects are aircraft. One ship, one car and one large scale figure project. Each project is based on a different type of painting, masking, and building approach.

Project 1 is a WWII M4 Sherman. As you can imagine, it's about painting a monochromatic subject. It walks you through step by step. Discussing how close you should be and what pressure you should be working at. As you may imagine, Project 2 is painting a monochromatic aircraft. A light gull grey Brewster Buffalo. Aaron walks you through the procedure. He continues to do this with each project. With each project becoming a little more complex.

We have some expert air brusher in our group. They might get something from this book, but for the rest of us, the novice and intermediate air brushers, this book contains a lot of good info and ideas. (As for me, I do well with my single action brushes, but when it comes to the double action brush, I've got two left thumbs.) I highly recommend this book. It has a cover price of \$22.99. You might find it at your local hobby shop, or Amazon, or you can order it direct from the Kalmbach / Fine Scale web site. Fine Scale does put their books on sale a number of times a year, which is how I obtained my copy. I rate it 4.0 thumbs up on the Del scale. (www.kalmbachHobbyStore.com)
