

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President's Message

Put That Model in Its Place!

I was walking through a model show recently and, as always, was both awed and inspired by the quality and imagination on display. But something struck me as I walked past another line of tables filled with various scales of model airplanes - all were wheels down, flaps up, pilotless, cowls closed and sitting on the table. Now don't get me wrong – these were fine examples of miniatures and worth whatever awards they earned. But still...is this how ALL models should be on display?

As modelers we have the self-anointed right of poetic license. Colors of paint, extra add-on equipment, decal markings – none of these must be historically accurate for us to enjoy the hobby. Our hobby accepts everything from the ultimate "rivet counter" to the layperson who just wants a P-51 on their shelf. But this poetic license can also extend to the setting in which the model is shown.

Imagine a beautiful 1:48 scale P-51, perhaps in the Old Crow markings of Bud Andersen, expertly assembled with photo-etch and aftermarket resin, beautifully painted and slightly weathered with the perfect application of decals. The canopy is glossy, the wheels show a slight bulge from the weight of the aircraft and the D-Day stripes are neat and crisp. Yet there it sits on the display table with the admiring public left to wonder why this plane is any different than all the other planes around it. Sure, it looks nicer and the paint job is snazzy, and it just looks "cool"...but there is so much more to the story!

Now imagine that same plane sitting on a 10" x 10" display base covered in static grass with just the right amount of dirt worn through to represent an airfield in southern England in 1944 or northern France in 1945. The cowling is off on the ground and the exquisitely produced Merlin engine is being worked on by two mechanics while the pilot (Captain Andersen himself) looks on with more than a passing interest. In the foreground is a Ford GPW jeep that has mud and dirt on it along with the airfield mutt sitting in the passenger seat. Perhaps the plane has just returned from a mission over Normandy strafing ground targets or escorting B-17s over Germany! Or perhaps the mission is a few hours away and the mechanics are scurrying to get the engine just right. The pilot stops by to check on progress before getting one last meal before the mission!

Sometimes the right setting (I suppose we are talking about dioramas) can really make a model pop and tell a great story at the same time. I used to shy away from dioramas but there are so many good (and cheap) products on the market that doing so is no big deal at all. Try it – you make like it!

I hope you all enjoyed the holiday dinner the Golf Club of Illinois! I welcome your feedback on this venue as we always try to make this event as good as can be (within the budget of course).

The planning for NIMCON continues to gain momentum and the call to volunteers is still going out! Please consider contacting Tom Reese or Robert Raver to volunteer – all are welcome and even an hour can make a difference.

Newsletter Articles Needed



Weathering a Vietnam F-100 Super Sabre

For the longest time I finished my aircraft models as factory fresh. The thought of spoiling a perfectly good paint job with grime and dirt made me cringe. My adversity to weathering started to wane several years ago after seeing more and more weathering techniques on our member's models, on those I saw at various shows, and in various publications and websites.

So I started to experiment. First with panel line washes. Then I added pre-shading to my repertoire. Post shading naturally followed. And more recently filters and paint chipping.

You might ask, why the change of heart? To my eye it became much more visually appealing and more importantly added a much needed level of creativity and fun to the process.

My basic sequence of steps is:

Pre-shading

Base colors

Post shading

Clear coat

Panel line wash

Clear coat

Decals

Clear coat

Flat coat

Filters

Flat coat

Pastels

To illustrate these I'm picking up where I left off with my article on heat distressing my F-100C from the October 2018 newsletter.

There are many ways to achieve these results. Mine are just what I've learned from other members, books, and online forums. I'm always looking to learn some new technique (the latest is water color pencils) to make the model pop a little more. I hope you find this helpful and it inspires you to try something different!



1) Normally I just spray black on the panel lines. However since I was spraying Alclad for the burnt metal I decided to spray the entire plane black and give black basing a go.



2) The idea behind black basing is to randomly build up irregular patterns of the base color over the black. The goal being to get a subtle mottle effect. I use enamels and thin these 1 to 1 with thinner spraying several light (almost mist) coats until I get the effect I want. Which really means what looks good to my eye.



3) Not sure I achieved the results I hoped for but you still get the pre-shaded panel lines! Just a reason the try it again on a future build.




4) Starting with the lightest color I build up the color slowly. I free handed the camo by outlining the area and then filling in the centers of the panels.




5) Here is the final results of the tan. Again I missed the mark on the mottle effect of black basing but the panel lines are nicely visible.




7) Now with all three colors. When spraying free hand I spray at an angle away form the color already applied to avoid overspray.



6) Now with the medium green applied. Don't worry about pre-shading being overdone as subsequent steps will tone it down.



8) I used liquid mask to get an irregular pattern around the burnt metal. I was not happy with the effect (photo 7) so I touched up with my airbrush for a softer/chipped effect.



9) Here I've applied post shading. I lighten each color with white and I little yellow so it doesn't look too bleached. You have to force yourself to over do the effect as later weathering really dials it back.




10) Another view of the masked burnt metal area before touch up.



11) After touching up there is much more realistic worn effect of the paint burning off.



12) A coat of Tamiya clear gloss has been applied followed by an oil wash. I use artist oils thinned with terpenoid and flowed into the details. Then I remove the excess with Kleenex.



13) Oil wash on the left and with out on the right.



14) Another coat of clear gloss protects the oil wash before applying the decals. Then another clear gloss to seal the decals. I then spray a coat of Tamiya clear flat. The flat finish provides some texture for the oil dot filters that follow to stick to.







15) This series of phots shows dot filtering. Again using artist oils I randomly apply dots of colors. In this case blue, burnt sienna, and gray. Then using a flat brush moistened with terpenoid I start blending the dots in the direction of the air flow. This is one technique I think you have to be careful not to over do.





17) The blending process. It looks hideous at first. Don't be alarmed. Just keep removing until you get the look you want. Or remove it all and start over. That's the beauty or it.



18) Not a great pic but here is the final effect. Once this is done I spray Model Master flat to seal everything. Model Master flat is dead flat and really tones all the weathering down. If you are too subtle in your weathering application you can lose the effects under this dead flat coat.



19) My final step is ground pastels. I used these for exhaust stains, gun blast stains, etc. Super simple to do. I shave some off a pastel chalk with an Exacto knife and brush it on.


