From the President

During late January's polar vortex, my wife and I were hunkered down on the couch watching *The Thing* (the underrated 2011 *prequel* to John Carpenter's 1982 film of the same name). She mentioned that on precisely these kinds of frigid January nights she loved watching *The Thing* as well as its 1951 inspiration, *The Thing from Another World*. I agreed, although my preferred winter film *The Empire Strikes Back* depicts scenes on the ice planet Hoth rather than the polar regions of Earth. My thoughts quickly turned to possible model kits that could be built in the spirit of accepting our current meteorological plight.

If you're lucky, you might find (or already own) a vintage Aurora kit of *The Thing from Another World* but a couple of resin kits from John Carpenter's *The Thing* are obtainable. Other, less fantastic, figures might include Gen. George Washington at Valley Forge, a French soldier or Russian Cossack from Napoleon's 1812 retreat from Moscow, or perhaps a military figure from Adolf Hitler's similar mistake (Operation Barbarossa) almost 130 years later.

Operation Barbarossa also provides a great variety of armored vehicles and aircraft subjects as does another WWII winter clash, the Battle of the Bulge. Panzers, Tigers, T-34s, KV-1s Shermans, and Cromwells provide tank enthusiasts many building options. Further, German Bf 109s, He 111s, Do 17s, Ju 87s and Ju 88s, Russian Yak 1s, MiG-3s, LaGG-3s, IL-2s, American P-51s, P-47s, B-17s, and British Spitfires and Typhoons offer plenty of winged choices. Equally chilly but slightly more contemporary, the Korean War's Battle of Chosin Reservoir offers some additional modeling picks.

Maritime subjects might include the American submarine USS Nautilus (SSN-571) which first crossed the North Pole in 1958 or one of a couple existing ice breaker models. Alas, I could only find mention of a 1:65 scale *wooden* kit of the HMS Terror which perished in 1845 while trying to find and navigate the elusive Northwest Passage. For car builders, perhaps Revell's GMC Pickup Truck

with a snow plow might be worthy. Gene Snow's *Snow Man* Charger Funny Car could provide a tongue-in-cheek take on the season. Coming full circle, Bandai kits of the Star Wars' Snowspeeder and the Imperial AT-AT Walker return us to the icy embrace of planet Hoth.

If you do find a suitable seasonal kit and are able to complete it by November, keep in mind that one of CMS 23's special theme awards is Best Winter Camouflage. Stay warm and see you at the February meeting.

What the Heck is That?

Last month the *What the Heck?* was the 1939 Graham-Paige Model 97 "Sharknose" Sedan.

The Graham brothers, Joseph, Robert and Ray were very talented and skillful business men. They started with an investment in a glass company making bottles and then in 1919 decided to get into the automobile manufacturing business. First they made kits to convert Ford Model Ts and TTs into trucks. From there they began to build their own trucks using Dodge motors and sell them through Dodge dealers. Business was so good that in 1922 they expanded from their plant in Evansville, Indiana to plants in Detroit and Stockton, California. In 1925 Dodge purchased their truck firm and they became executives at Dodge, at least until Chrysler bought Dodge in 1928.

Seeing the sale of Dodge coming they made a plan to get back on their own and purchased the Paige-Detroit Motor Company, and began offering a line of Graham-Paige sedans and light trucks (the trucks only lasted a short while once Dodge reminded them of their non-compete clause).

Looking to make a mark, and some sales in during the Great Depression, the Grahams hired Amos Northrup of Murray Body to design a new model for 1938. Northrup's nose-first Model 97 design, finished by Graham after his death, was introduced with the slogan "Spirit in Motion". The grille, fenders and wheel openings were designed to convey motion even when standing still (the Forward Look DeSotos say 'thank you'). This design won the prestigious Concours D'Elegance in Paris, France, as well as awards in the Prix d'Avant-Garde at Lyon, the Prix d'Elegance at Bordeaux, and the







Grand Prix d'Honneur at Deauville, France. It was also widely praised in the American press and by American designers, but unfortunately not so much by the American public. Only some 8000 cars were sold during the model's 1938 through 1940 run.

By all accounts the Model 97s, as well as all the Graham-Paige models, were solid, reliable automobiles. Our featured car came powered by a 218-cubic inch Continental engine, rated at 90hp normally aspirated or 116hp when supercharged. The engine had more efficient intake and exhaust components specifically designed by the Graham engineering department. The Model 97 also had the tail lights mounted above the beltline, where the roof meets the trunk, much like the high-mounted third brake light on today's cars.

While the nose-first design wasn't popular when it was new, at least on cars (see the Raymond Loewy designed T1 locomotive), cars enthusiasts back to the 50s have taken a shine to it and given it the "sharknose" moniker.


