### Three from Heller

Svenska Aeroplan AB has produced quite a number of

Svenska Aeropian AB has produced quite a number of exotic designs over the years, among them the twin boom single engine pusher J-21A, produced in 1946. This aircraft is made even more interesting by the subsequent change to a jet powerplant for the J-21R.

Molded in olive drab plastic, this kit is yet another example of Heller's high quality. The parts are thin with snarp edges and are both sink and flash free. Heller has done an excellent job of designing this kit. The single piece lower wing half guarantees the proper dihedral, the divided canopy captures the bulged side panels correctly and the booms lock positively into the wing. Also notable is the neatly done cockpit assembly. Not all is well however. The boom fairings on the upper wing surface should be guite blunt, not coming to a point at the leading edge. The booms also look a bit shallow in the wheel well area. Some minor short-comings include the misplaced wingroot intake splitters, shallow exhaust stack detail, the "hand carved" fabric surfaces and the omission of the landing lights at the end of the booms.

The decals show Heller's usual tendency for bright heavy inks. The markings are about as colorful as the J-21s ever got: for the 1rst Sqdn of F9 and the 2nd Sqdn

### DH VAMPIRE FB.5

The only Vampire kits in 1/72 that I can remember nereofore are the old Airfix and Frog offerings which were not well received even in their day. In this light, the Heller kit (and its companion Prench version, the Mistral) is a great step forward. However, compared to this latest batch of Heller releases, it's a disappointment. The quality of surface detail varies greatly, from the fine raised lines on the nose, to the heavy inspection panels under the wings. The inscribed lines around the control surfaces are shallow and erratic. The fit of the parts is also a bit below par in the boom attachment area and that inexplicably separate trailing edge bit. The canopy is a bit undersized, both too low and too narrow to cover the cockpit opening fully. The worst problem is the narrowness of the nose when viewed in the plan view. That's going to take a bit of putty to flesh out.

The kit is not without merit however. Most of the parts fit very well. The landing gear and instrument panel are nicely sculpted and wheel well details are molded in.

Decals (which look significantly better than usual) are for the kAP's 112th Sqdn bearing a "shark-mouth" and France's 4'E.C. Lafaette.

Of the three, the Alouette III is the most welcome.

SA ALQUETTE III

Of the three, the Alouette III is the most welcome. While this helicopter has seen enormously widespread civil and military service, it has not previously been offered in 1/72. We are fortunate indeed that Heller has chosen to do it yet again, as their line already included the Alouette in 1/50 and 1/85 years ago.

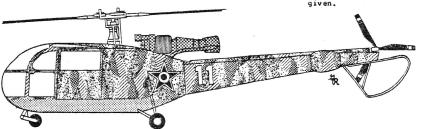
Despite the vivid color (shades of Matchoox!) and a bewilderment of numerous small "fiddley bits", it is a first rate kit. The molding is flawless and surface detail subtle and spare. The bounty of small parts, though occasionally neavy due to molding limitations, provide plenty of detail in the cockpit and rotor hub. Study of the intructions is imperative. Only the engine looks boald, being devoid of all but simple shape. The kit provides engines for the SA 316 and SA 319.

The most commendable feature of the kit is the way heller molded the cockpit glazing in three sections; front and sides. Since the clear parts also include unglazed portions of fuselage, many seams can be filled and sanded without worry. Unfortunately, the parting line is necessarily complex and does not fit well. It is strongly recommended that the doors be cut off and attached in an open position, thereby avoiding the problem entirely.
